

To the Editor,

Thank you to Wendy Townsend for inviting her group of "Crazy Quilters" to the Tasmanian Quilting Guild's Christmas Meeting which we attended in December. Wendy has been trying to encourage members of our quilting group to join the guild and we came along with the expectation that some of us would join.

The 'Crazy Quilters' are a group that laughs, shares work and stories and we expected the same high standard of friendship and encouragement from the guild members. Unfortunately this was lacking.

I am also a 'Crazy Quilter' (Suzanne), and am President of the Southern Beaches Regional Arts group who have raised their member numbers in just two years from 6 to 70 by simply having monthly show and tell evenings where members and guests are welcomed and encouraged to share their art works.

We suggest that if your member numbers are falling maybe it's time to examine your attitude towards guests at these functions as they are prospective future members. Something such as an introductory show bag made up with various samples from the stalls selling merchandise at the meetings (advertising for them) which could be given to guests. Two or three guild members (not necessarily committee members) could "meet and greet" guests, hand out the show bags and maybe chat with them about their quilting expertise.

Personally we were very disappointed with the attitude of your members who made no move to welcome us as guests and prospective members. We were all willing to become members of your group but only one was inclined to do so after such a cool welcome. As a group you need to ask yourselves "why?" and set about making major changes if you want growth in your group.

Sometimes all it takes is a genuine smile and a show of interest to bring that encouragement.

We hope this feedback will assist the Guild in the future.

They are also working on a special shroud.

Break O'Day Stitchers

Break O'D Stitchers aim to support associations in their community and members have recently completed a Christmas quilt which hangs in the local Medical Centre.

Presently working on group quilts for cancer patients in the children's ward at the LGH, as well as for patients at St Mary's auxiliary Hospital and Medea Park Nursing Home.

Other 2016 activities include: making 150 cushions for Cancer Council; helping TS Argonaut naval cadets sew on their insignia correctly; teaching sewing and patchwork skills to primary students in school holiday programmes; buying and making bags for #ITSINTTHEBAG society, making 2 quilts for the Flying Doctor Service containers (accommodation for pilots) in Hobart. --

Three sewing machines for members and visitors and a special table for sandwiching quilts have helped achieve these activities.

 Devon Patchworkers and Quilters "Quilts in the Garden" at Hawthorn Villa, Carrick,in support of Multiple Sclerosis unfortunately experienced a very wet weekend, so the quilts did not get displayed in the beautifully prepared gardens. The event raised over \$2000.00 and the raffle was won by Lesley Lyons.

SUB COMMITTEES

Tasmanian Art Quilt Prize (Barbara Mellor)

Barbara reported that Break O'Day group appreciated the visit from Deb, Northern Rep Copies of the agreement between the Guild and TAQP and the TAQP budget were distributed Barbara reported that Greg Alexander (Bernina) will support the Guild and TAQP for this event. There is at the moment, only a verbal agreement.

The next exhibition will be in May 2018 at the Maritime Museum's, newly renovated up-stairs gallery and will run for four or five weeks. This will ensure a suitable amount of time between the Expo and TAQP.

Barbara Mellor proposed "that the Tasmanian Art Quilt Prize be run as a continuing event by a subcommittee of the Tasmanian Quilting Guild. This event will be self-funded by way of raising funds from raffles and other means and will continue so long as Bernina, or another major sponsor, agrees to provide the first prize. The subcommittee will work within the agreement signed today (3 December, 2016) by the TQG President and the Chair of the subcommittee. This agreement will stay in place until changed by a motion put to the members at a general meeting of the Guild.

Seconded Janine Richardson. Carried. A few members abstained from voting.

GENERAL BUSINESS

Expertise Events

- An email was received from Nicole McLennanof Expertise Events, requesting that TQG promote and advertise the Hobart Quilt and Craft Fairin February 2017 to members through emails, our Newsletter and on our website.
- Mention was made of an email received from South Australia concerning the problems experienced by them with regard to not being invited to display Best of the Best at ACQ. However, it was deemed a matter between S.A and Expertise Events and unrelated to our situation.
- Many members at the meeting agreed that Guild addresses/emails should definitely not be forwarded to EE for them to send out advertising as it would constitute a privacy breach.
- Discussion followed and it was decided that it would be beneficial to the Guild to promote the Quilt and Craft Fair, as refusing to do so would reflect badly on the Guild. It would deny members their right to know about it.
- It was noted that it was not possible to advertise in the newsletter due to timing and Expertise Events are to be advised of this. They are also to be advised that the date of the event appears on the Guild Calendar of Events.
- After discussion, Margaret Trealoar proposed that Tasmanian Quilting Guild support Expertise Events' Quilt and Craft Fair by forwarding their emails to members and advertising for them on the Guild website for a reasonable sum.

It was the time of the year when the farmers around the state had been devastated by the horrendous floods so our quilting group, Quilt Inn, of which Di was a member decided that as children and animals were dear to her heart, we would help a farmer.

QUILTER OF THE YEAR

At the December meeting Fran Williams was awarded the title of Quilter of the Year. The Committee of Management received several nominations this year but only one member received more than one nomination and that was Fran who received several. This made the task of choosing her very easy. We would like to congratulate Fran and share with you some excerpts from the nomination received from Chris Coulbeck-McMurray which really says it all.

"Fran Williams and her partners opened one of the first quilting shops in Tasmania, The Quilt Patch, in March, 1986. The Quilt Patch was a very strong supporter of TQG and from its beginning until it closed in 2011 it had a trader's table at every meeting.

Back in the late nineties the finances of the Guild were lacking and, rather than charge an entrance fee, the members decided that a raffle at each meeting would be a more fun way of raising some funds to cover the rental of the hall. Fran Williams volunteered for the Quilt Patch to donate a metre of fabric for this raffle and it became known as the Mystery Metre Raffle. That donation continued right up until the closure of the shop and, at a rough reckoning, that would be about 54 to 56 metres of fabric that was donated over those years.

Fran did sit on the Committee of Management in the early years of the Guild – she was Treasurer and Workshop Coordinator and then Vice President and Workshop Coordinator and also Exhibition Convenor in the eighties. From that time on, though, Fran did not take on any role on the COM as she explained to me once, "I see conflict, and others will also, between being a shop owner and a committee member". I considered that to be a very gracious decision as Fran is a woman of strong opinions and would have been an asset on any committee. However, those strong opinions could be heard from the floor as a member because Fran is a regular attendee at Guild meetings.

In a recent clean out of some old Guild papers, I came across the Cash Receipts Book from 29 September, 1984, which must have been the first full year of the Guild's existence. On line 5 there is an entry "Fran Williams, Receipt No. 48, \$10.00". When an attempt was made leading up to the 21st Anniversary of the Guild to establish who were the foundation members of the Guild and who had been consistent members since the beginning, there were some doubts about a few members because of lost or incomplete records but there was no doubt with respect to Fran as a foundation member with continuous membership from the beginning.

It was from Fran's expertise that the Guild began to do valuations of quilts and the first valuers, led by Fran, got the valuation procedure started here in Tasmania. Fran has been called upon by the Tasmanian Museum to assess quilts and I am aware of at least one case when an insurance company asked her to assess the value of a damaged quilt. Fran represented the Guild as a delegate to ACQ in 1992 and 1993 when it was more about valuations.

Outside of the Guild, Fran has been a very active supporter of quilting in Tasmania and was instrumental in getting the Launceston Patchworks & Quilters Inc underway and, again, has been a member since its inception. Fran has been a very active teacher of quilting over the years and my first sampler (still to be completed!!!) was done in one of Fran's basic quilting classes. Many quilters have started their quilting journey from those classes with Fran."

As we said earlier, this sums it up well. Congratulations again Fran from all of us.

WHY LAUNCESTON?

Whilst the feedback we have had from members about holding this year's quilt show at Albert Hall has been mostly positive there have still been some questions raised as to why the Committee of Management chose Launceston for the venue of the next quilt show. We would now like to give you some idea of the thinking behind this decision.

- Why not hold the quilt show in the capital city as is the case in most other states? The population
 of most mainland states is centred in or around the capital cities. Something like 80% to 90% of the
 population of each state lives in or around the capital city. This is not the case in Tasmania where
 is there is a pretty even spread of population.
- In the Northern Territory the quilt show alternates between Darwin and Alice Springs each year simply because of the split in the population and the distances involved.
- When Kate Berry made her first report as Exhibition Convenor at the March meeting last year she said that it was her dream to have the quilt show travel around the state and a lot of members simply expected that the next quilt show would be in Launceston.
- Many members from the north west of the state cannot travel to Hobart to see the quilts but they
 are able to make the trip to Launceston and we thought that this should be taken into consideration.
- Further, some members have such distances to travel that it is not possible for them to go to the
 quilt show and return on the same day so accommodation is needed and this can be expensive.
 We thought it was unfair that those people travelling from the same area would have to pay
 accommodation every year. We acknowledge that we are trying to arrange billeting but this is not
 always possible or practical for everyone.
- The cost of accommodation is also a factor for many of those working at the quilt show each year and we intend to set up a register of members willing to billet non local workers.
- Parking we acknowledge that there is not free parking available on the Friday of the quilt show but there are car parks within easy walking distance which charge \$3.00 or \$4.00 for the whole day.
 We will provide a "mud map" on our advertising to let visitors know where these are. Parking from lunch time on Saturday and all day Sunday is free.
- Expertise Events are holding their Craft & Quilt Fair in Hobart this month so if our exhibition was to be held in Hobart in September this year it would mean that there would be three quilt shows in Hobart within twelve months.
- There are some jobs in the organising of the quilt show which are better handled by members living closer to the venue and if the venue is alternated each year then each set of locals would only have to do these jobs every second year.
- As noted in the article in the last newsletter we used an estimate of numbers from the last show held in Launceston to check the commercial viability of having the exhibition in Launceston but we have been told that a count of the votes for Viewers' Choice is not really accurate and we do acknowledge this. However, it was the only information we had. We realise that not everyone attending the show will cast a vote and we also acknowledge that some visitors may vote more than once. However, we believe that these "unders" and "overs" would just about cancel each other out and that the number of votes would give us a reasonable estimate.

Why Launceston?

Our Guild is a lovely group, small enough to be personal, but with enough brilliant people to make exhibitions and events a success with fantastic organisation and participation. I was proud to be nominated Vice-President but dubious as to what I had to offer. I was anxious about making decisions on behalf of other people. So I started with one thing in my head. "for the good of the guild".

Initially, I was preparing for the TQG Expo for 2017 to be in the south, but there were many ideas and thoughts taken into account at the Committee of Management meeting that led us to our decision. Some of these include;

- 1. Comments made in discussions at previous Guild meetings lead me to think that we planned to rotate the exhibition around the state.
- 2. Fairness;
- Sharing costs and workload for our Guild members involved in organisation and staffing the exhibition.
- Accessibility for our patrons from all over our state.
- 3. Venue;

The opportunity to use a prominent venue that provides specific facilities for exhibitions; layout, lighting, hostess kitchenette space, secure rooms for sponsorship, function space, signage and wheel chair access.

The high profile Launceston venue may increase numbers through the door in turn increasing profit. An increase in profit is deserved for all the hard work and effort that goes into putting on our exhibition.

4. Funding:

A Grant is up for grabs from the Launceston City Council which, if received, will contribute to the costs of running this year's exhibition.

After healthy debate the COM settled unanimously on the Albert Hall in Launceston for the TQG 2017 Expo. With the information presented at the time this seemed to be "for the good of the guild". Please remember this is "Why Launceston?" and there is no anti Hobart sentiment.

Report for North: December 2016

Bridport Textile Group

The Bridport Quilt Show was organised by the Bridport Textile Group and Dorset Quilters andran from 12th – 15th January 2017. Approximately 40 beautiful quilts were on show. Individual members from the group gave working demonstrations of their skills; there were stylish handmade bags, a huge range of stunning cushion covers with inserts, handmade wooden toys and lots of other crafted items - mostly made by members of the group. Lisa Greenacre from *Quilts by the Sea*had a range of fabrics andsewing notions for visitors andother traders had some great bargains. A quilt made by the group was raffled, with proceeds going to *Blazeaid*. A car show on the green on the Saturday and an art exhibition in the CWA hall meant that visitors had plenty to see and enjoy.

Christmas lunch for the group was at *The Bunkers* restaurant on 6 December. For 2017, members will begin by exploring the different possibilities of cot quilts. The group has also been busy through the year: they made 150 bags for games for children at the local primary school and 83 pairs of men's boxer shorts to raise money for Prostate Cancer. They are also working on a special shroud.

Break O'Day Stitchers

Break O'Day Stitchers aimto support associations in their community and members have recently completed a Christmas quilt which now hangsin the local Medical Centre. Members have also been working on group quilts for children in the cancer ward at Launceston General Hospital, patients at St Mary's Auxiliary Hospital and Medea Park Nursing Home. Other activities in 2016 include making 150 cushions for the Cancer Council; helping TS Argonaut navel cadets sew on their insignia correctly and also running a primary program every school holidays, so that children learn sewing and patchwork skills. Members have brought and made bags for the #ITSINTHEBAG society; the bags are filled with essential and luxury items for women in need. Members have also made two quilts for the Flying Doctor Service containers in Hobart — these containers are accommodation for pilots and were recently featured in a *Better Homes and Gardens* Program. Three sewing machinesand a special table for sandwiching quilts have been acquired in 2016, to help with all these activities.

Break O'Day Stitchers are already preparing for 2017, with a Major Easter Exhibition. The theme and challengefor the exhibition is 'Earth, Wind and Sky'. More details are on the website, and in our latest TQG newsletter. There will also be a Leesa Chandler workshop 15 – 16 July, 2017 and bookings for this are essential.

Another date for your 2017 diary is the long weekend in June, 10 - 12 June as 10 prominent art quilters will be exhibiting in St Helens as part of '10 Days on the Island'.

We are also celebrating with a luncheon and a few fun activities on the day. - Lisa



They have put forward the proposal that in the future we hold tele conferences. This could be a very controversial item but we believe that it is definitely worth considering. It costs our guild around \$3,000 each year to participate in the QuiltAustralia conference as it is held now and these costs will only rise. Admittedly tele conferences would give fewer opportunities for networking but this can easily be overcome by the use of email and other means of communication. It will certainly be an interesting discussion and we will give a full report after the conference.


