Di has also attended AQC every year since its inception and was recognised, as were others, for having attended every year at the 10th event. 

INSURANCE COVER FOR TASMANIAN QUILTING GUILD

There have been some questions raised again recently regarding insurance cover so, hopefully, the following will help to answer some of those questions. Please note, however, that this is general information, we are not insurance experts just members trying to explain our insurance cover. As we researched this article we sent a copy of the draft to our insurance broker and he emailed back a lot of points to consider and suggestions. If we take into account all that he has said, this article would be pages long so we have decided to write a paper on insurance which will be available on the website along with the Constitution of the Guild and the By Laws. This can be the "bible" on insurance and we will try to keep it as up to date as possible.

What does Public Liability Insurance cover?

Public liability insurance protects you and your organisation against the financial risk of being found liable for negligence. Basically, public liability insurance covers you and your organisation for losses and damage a third party suffers (or claims to have suffered) as a result of your activities.

In plain English this provides protection against legal and court costs (i.e. legal liability) in the event that someone is injured or has their property damaged while you are providing a service to them. A simple example would be if a visitor to the Tasmanian Quilt Expo tripped on a piece of loose wire from a sound system. Then public liability insurance would cover the Guild if that third party claimed for injuries sustained as a result. The groups who take up the Guild's offer of insurance would also be covered for public liability insurance when they are holding an exhibition as well as when they are holding their regular meetings. Many venues used by quilting groups require a copy of the Certificate of Currency for Public Liability Insurance to be provided before an event is held or when leasing premises to hold meetings.

What does Volunteer Insurance cover?

Volunteer insurance provides cover for volunteers working for your group in an official capacity. For example for during fundraising, organising activities or assisting at events as well as direct travel to and from these activities. The policy provides volunteers with cover should they sustain personal injury whilst working in a volunteer capacity for your group. A register of volunteers and officials should be kept when they are engaged in activities on the group's behalf. For example, volunteers at Island Quilts have always been asked to sign in and out and members attending general meetings are also asked to sign in.

Members of the groups who take up the Guild's offer of insurance would be covered for volunteer insurance as with the public liability cover. With volunteer insurance it is vital that all members are listed when renewing the group's insurance and that new members are added to the insurance. If a member of a group is not listed when renewal is paid, then it is our understanding that they would not be covered unless they are added as a member.

Cover for property

Included in the insurance cover for the Guild is some cover for equipment and other property owned by the Guild or owned by groups who are members of the Guild. This cover is only for items owned by the group and does not cover anything owned by an individual member of the group or the Guild. An example would be the quilt stands owned by the Guild, they would be covered if lost or stolen. Another example would be if a group was making a quilt to raffle and it was stolen or lost in a fire. If it could be shown that the quilt was definitely the property of the group and not an individual member, then it too would be covered. It should be stressed that quilts owned by individual members of the Guild or groups are not covered by insurance and members should always ensure that their quilts are either separately insured or covered by their householder's comprehensive insurance. This can be done by contacting your insurance company.

We hope to have the full paper on insurance cover on the website very shortly. Jenny Croxton and Margaret Treloar.

REPORTS

QuiltAustralia

This is actually the report on the conference for the Australian Council of Quilters but during the conference the name was changed to *QuiltAustralia* – hence the heading.

We were all very pleased with the way the conference went – the delegates from the mainland were most impressed with the reception at Government House. In fact, our Governor was so gracious and welcoming that they could not have been anything other than impressed.

Tasmania presented three agenda items at the conference. The first was regarding the business practices of Expertise Events and the fact that they had failed to negotiate with the Guild during the dispute over excess charges. Upon being read, this agenda item was at first greeted with deadly silence from the delegates from the other Guilds. Finally, one of the delegates from South Australia spoke up for Tasmania and agreed that Expertise Events had treated us in a very shabby and unbusinesslike way. The rest of the delegates, however, did not comment.

Eventually, someone said that we should be helped to advertise the Tasmanian Quilt Expo and all the mainland guilds agreed that they would be very happy to put any advertising material we can give them on their websites and in their magazines and that they would promote the Quilt Expo in any way they could.

There was then some general discussion regarding each guild's relationship with Expertise Events and the consensus was that the different guilds have had different experiences with Expertise Events. Obviously, the guilds in the more populated states are in a much better bargaining position than Tasmania.

The second agenda item we put up was regarding the admission to the Guild of "commercial" or "retail" members as proposed recently. This was discussed at length and the general consensus was that the delegates did not feel it was a good idea and that commercial memberships do not benefit the Guilds. The delegates from Victoria said that they had had shop owners become committee members in the past and it had not worked out. The delegates from Queensland said that they have had a member on the committee who is a shop owner and they had developed a code of conduct to deal with this. Whenever there could be a conflict of interest, this particular committee member stepped away from the discussion.

All delegates agreed that it was very important to support quilting businesses and gave various examples of how this was done in their states. It was agreed that educating novice quilters is more suited to shops than guilds and it was thought that it may be a good idea to ask these businesses what the guilds could do to help them.

The third agenda item was regarding the future of craft fairs and quilt exhibitions and after discussion it was generally agreed that there is still a future for these shows. However, it seems that the number of traders is down in all states and there are more "tacky" shops than there used to be. It would appear that the huge popularity of AQC has led to a downturn in numbers at some of the usual quilt and craft fairs. Quilters only had so much money to spend and if some of it is spent at AQC then this means there is less to spend at other venues.

It was a wonderful conference and we will provide you with another report in the August newsletter.

How will my quilt be valued?

When a quilt is valued by the Guild, we follow the methods used by some of the larger inter-state Guilds. There are four qualified valuers involved; three will value the quilt and the fourth will act as scribe. The quilt is held up in order to assess the visual impact. It is then laid out on a table, measurements are checked and the quilt examined in detail. Each valuer has a score sheet which consists of two sections, firstly the quilt as a whole covering general appearance, design, colour and overall effect. The second section is workmanship which reviews accuracy of the piecing, evenness of quilting stitches etc.

Each section has a sub-division to which points have been allocated, and each valuer works independently and scores each sub-division. Upon completion, the valuer totals the scores she has given in each sub-division and this results in a total score out of 100. The three valuer's scores are added together and averaged. There is a Chart which gives a Scale value for each percentage point. The value, is applied to the square meterage of the quilt. This method takes into account the size of the quilt so a large quilt will have a greater value than a small quilt with the same average percentage. The valuers do not sit around, have a discussion and come up with a value. They go through a prescribed procedure and the value is calculated from an independent scale. The valuation process is an attempt to apply an objective methodology to what can be, a very subjective thing. The valuers are unaware of the actual cost of commercial quilting, patterns, materials etc. They assess the durability and quality of the materials used for the purpose intended and score appropriately. Design and the quality of quilting are assessed based on the actual result, not the cost of achieving that result.

What the Valuers look for

When valuing a quilt, the Valuation Committee uses a point system. An average of the points allocated by all valuers are given a figure in dollars according to a scale. This figure is multiplied by the square measurement of the quilt to give the valuation of the quilt.

THE "WE CARE" QUILT

For those of you that saw anything of the memorial service for 20 years since the Port Arthur massacre, you would have seen two quilts in the background. The one with the diagonal pattern was made by members of the Tasmanian Quilting Guild Inc. with contributions from interstate. The blocks were assembled at the Friendship Day on 27 July 1996 and then hand quilted by several members. The following is an extract from the Island Threads for December 1996.

"During 'Show and Tell' the Mayor of Tasman Municipality, Mr Neil Noye, was introduced by the President, Barbara Osborne, and was presented with the beautifully made 'We Care' quilt for the people of Port Arthur area following the tragedy there. The quilt was assembled from small blocks made by caring quilters from Tasmania and interstate, with names of the contributors, and messages of hope and peace. Truly, a caring and sharing tribute from quilters. This gesture spread across our State as it appeared on 'Win News' that evening."

In the letter from Mr and Mrs Noyes thanking the Guild for the quilt they said;

"The quilt presented to Tasman has been much admired by those who have viewed it. It was put on display at the annual Nursing Home Fete and will be available for showing at similar events. At this stage its permanent home is envisaged as being at the Council Chambers Nubeena."

At the same time, the Executive Committee (now called the Committee of Management), each made a block and these were assembled in to a wall quilt which was presented to the Royal Hobart Hospital in recognition of the stressful time the staff experienced during the hours after the tragic event. This quilt later won second prize.

As Vice-President at the time I was involved with both quilts and seeing the "We Care" quilt on the news last week brought a lump to the throat and tears to the eyes. The members of this Guild have done some wonderful things over the years and it is a history we can all be proud of.

QUILT DEFINITION

A quilt must have at least three layers and be visibly quilted through all layers.

Quilts may be any shape. A quilt may be hand and/or machine pieced; it may be hand and/or machine quilted.

SIZE LIMITS

Large Quilts

Greater than 150 cm on any side and no greater than 290 cm on the longest side

Small Quilts

Greater than 50 cm on any side and no greater than 150 cm on the longest side

Little Quilts

Greater than 10 cm on any side and no greater than 50 cm on the longest side

CATEGORIES

There are no published categories for ISLAND QUILTS 2016. A subcommittee will review the entries and determine the categories applicable to the entries received. The subcommittee will consist of traditional, modern and art quilters and will come from all parts of the state so there is a balance in both style and geography. The decisions of the subcommittee are final.

ELIGIBILITY TO EXHIBIT

Entry in the exhibition is open to financial members of the Tasmanian Quilting Guild Inc (TQG) as at 29 July 2016.

An affiliated group that is a financial member of the TQG may enter two quilts. The entries may be;

- a quilt entered in the Group Category and/or
 - a quilt made by one of the affiliated group members. The individual maker does not have to be a financial member of TQG. The quilt will not be eligible for the Awards for Excellence. This opportunity to exhibit is available to an individual only once

Quilts that have won **BERNINA Best of Show** in an Australian state or territory exhibition are not eligible for the ISLAND QUILTS **BERNINA Best of Show Award**.

An item that has been exhibited in any other TQG exhibition may not be entered.

Students entering items in the Student Textile Competition do not need to be TQG members.

QUILT HOSTESSING

White glove duty is important for the safety and security of the quilts. With 200 quilts in ISLAND QUILTS and the special displays to protect as well as door, raffle and information tables to staff, lots of volunteers are needed.

We ask all entrants to do at least one two hour session of quilt hostess work. We understand that not everyone will be able to attend ISLAND QUILTS so in that case, please organise a substitute to do a session for you.

Please return the Volunteer Registration Form with your entry forms. The Volunteer Form also includes half day sessions for helping on judging and hanging days.

CONDITIONS OF ENTRY

Each member may submit up to four entries for judging and/or inclusion in the display. This limit excludes entries in the 2015 challenge (display only). Framed entries will not be accepted.

All entries except group quilts, collaborative quilts and commercially quilted quilts must be the sole work of the exhibitor. Group quilt entries should acknowledge all contributors to the quilt.

A separate entry form is required for each quilt or item. One payment & declaration form is required from each entrant. If you have any difficulty completing the forms please email or phone the convenor.

ENTRY FORMS

Please fill in all relevant sections of the entry form, starting with your name and membership number and the title of your quilt. Please measure the width and length of your quilt in centimetres and write these in the size section.

NON-JUDGED QUILTS

Please indicate if you do not want to have your quilt judged. Your quilt will still be eligible for consideration for special awards.

ELIGIBILITY FOR AWARDS

All judged entries will be eligible for the Excellence Awards. The **BERNINA Best of Show Award** will be selected from the category prize winners and will retain the category prize awarded.

Prizes and certificates will be awarded at the judging panel's discretion, and the judges' decisions are final. Prize winners will receive a certificate, a rosette and a prize with a monetary value.

The number of awards for each category will be determined by the number of entries in the category. The following is a guideline for the allocation of prizes.

- Four entries: first prize
- Seven entries: first and second prizes
- Ten or more entries: first, second and third prizes

Highly commended awards may be made in any category at the discretion of the judges. Winners will receive a certificate and a rosette.

If there are less than five entries in any category this may be combined with another category for the purposes of judging. The category subcommittee will make these decisions.

Awards for Excellence will be selected from across all categories.

Special Awards will be selected from across all members' items entered for judging and display.

The Long Arm Machine Quilting Award will be made to the quilt judged to have the best quilting done on a long arm machine.

Prizes in the Commercially Quilted category will be awarded to the person who entered the quilt. The other person involved will receive a certificate and rosette.

BERNINA Best of Show Award

The quilt that wins the **BERNINA Best of Show Award** must be available for the Australian National Quilt Award next year and subsequently for exhibit at all the State and Territory Guild exhibitions throughout next year.

Outstanding Tasmanian Quilt Award

This award may be made if the **BERNINA Best of Show Award** is awarded to a member who resides outside
Tasmania.

Best of Tasmania - AQC 2017

Five quilts will be selected from the winners of category prizes and excellence awards to represent Tasmania in the **Best of the Best** display to be held at the Australasian Quilters Convention in 2017.

Quilts will be selected by members of the TQG Committee of Management and the ISLAND QUILTS Committee.



DESIGN SOURCE

Fill in the design source section. TQG's copyright policy is on the last page of this handbook. Please demonstrate your understanding of the policy by signing the declaration and payment form.

Please specify what techniques were used in your quilt and what kind of machine was used for machine quilting.

MAKER'S STATEMENT

The maker's statement will appear on your quilt on an information sheet. If your quilt has a story or a particular design inspiration please tell us. Our visitors love to know the stories behind the quilts.

Please limit your maker's statement to around thirty words.

ACCOMPANYING PHOTOGRAPH

Please staple an A4 size colour photograph of the quilt or item to each entry form. Entries will not be accepted without a photograph. A photo of the unquilted top is acceptable.

Please ensure that the colours are a good representation of your quilt.

PAYMENT AND DECLARATION FORM

One completed and signed Payment and Declaration Form is required from each entrant. Please complete all sections of this form.

ACCEPTANCE OF ENTRY

You will be notified by email (or mail if you have no email address) that your quilts have been accepted for display at ISLAND QUILTS approximately two weeks before the exhibition.

This notification will specify the category each quilt has been placed in and the display number within the category, e.g. A7. This is to be clearly shown on or beside the label on your quilt bag.

The ISLAND QUILTS Committee has the right to reject any entry.

PHOTOGRAPHY

The committee reserves the right to photograph all items for the TQG archives, the TQG website, the TQG newsletter, and for a USB stick for distribution to magazines and for public sale.

The USB sticks will be for sale at ISLAND QUILTS and available at the next TQG meeting.

Please be aware that the public may photograph the quilts.

VALUATION AND INSURANCE

While we encourage members to have their quilts valued this is not a requirement before you enter your quilts for display at ISLAND QUILTS.

While maximum care and security precautions will be taken when your quilts are in the care of TQG and its representatives, we do not provide insurance cover. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to make appropriate arrangements with their insurance company.

STATUS DEFINITIONS

On the Payment and Declaration Form you are asked to indicate your status. This is particularly important if you are submitting your quilt for judging.

PROFESSIONAL/ADVANCED QUILTER

Solely for the purposes of judging at this exhibition, a professional/advanced quiltmaker or quilter is defined as someone who has satisfied one or more of the following conditions;

- Has won a 'Best of Show' or has won two or more first prize blue ribbons/excellence in quilting awards in a major judged exhibition. A major judged exhibition is a 'state or territory guild' judged exhibition or competition or a national or international judged exhibition or competition. Verification of awards may be required.
- Has financial involvement, teaches or publishes in any media in the field of quilting.
- Sells, designs or participates in any aspect of making quilts for ongoing financial gain.
 Financial gain is any amount above the cost of creating the quilt, including design and fabrics, making teaching aids including samples, notes and travel expenses.

Having exhibited as a professional/advanced quilter in any major judged exhibition, amateur status cannot be resumed.

Any person entering a winning quilt as an amateur who is found to be of professional/advanced status will forfeit their award and prize.



COPYRIGHT POLICY

It is the policy of the organisers of Tasmanian Quilting Guild Inc (TQG) exhibitions to comply with Australian copyright laws. Copyright laws are designed to protect the creative skill of quilt designers as well as their right of recognition, while ensuring reasonable access to the quilts by members of the public.

Copyright laws are to be complied with by all entrants in TQG exhibitions.

To assist the organisers of TQG exhibitions to present a public display of quilts, it is essential that you complete and sign the declaration section of the Payment & Declaration form. Please sign this section or your quilt will not be displayed.

The following terms have been adopted by TQG to define the design source for quilts entered in TQG exhibitions

Original design applies when no other person has any claim on the design, i.e. you can claim copyright on the design and the design is all your own work – you have not used or been influenced by a quilt, artwork or photograph by another person.

Traditional design applies when traditional blocks have been used, e.g. Ohio Star, Rose of Sharon, blocks that are regarded as being in the public domain. You have made the choices of fabric, colour and setting for the quilt.

Version of someone else's design applies if you have followed someone else's pattern but made your own fabric choices and perhaps made variations to the design. You must name the designer and/or publication.

Someone else's design applies if you have followed someone else's pattern and fabric choices. You must name the designer and/or publication. This particularly applies to Block of the Month designs where fabric and pattern are provided and used.

Displaying a quilt that is a version of another person's design may be an infringement of copyright if the original designer is not acknowledged in the public display. Quilt designers must be given proper credit for their works otherwise it implies that the person who made the quilt on display is the author of the original work and this would be in breach of copyright laws. Making changes, even 10%, is not enough to make your quilt an original design.

If your quilt design is influenced by the artwork of a quilt you saw in an exhibition or a picture in a calendar, or anything over which another person can claim copyright, you should obtain permission for your work to be exhibited. For example, if you make a quilt using the design of a stained glass window from your local church you should get permission from the church to exhibit your quilt and maybe even, if appropriate, from the designer of the window. A copy of this written permission must accompany your entry form.

The name of the maker as well as the design source will be published in the catalogue and/or on display cards for all quilts exhibited at TQG exhibitions.

Be aware that trademarks and official logos cannot be reproduced in articles for public display. For example Harry Potter, Disney characters or football club logos cannot be displayed in exhibitions without written permission from the copyright holder. A copy of this written permission must accompany your entry form.

- The design source for all quilts must be acknowledged. If someone else, for example a teacher, parent, or relation, has helped to make the quilt, that person must be acknowledged and the nature of the help given identified.
- Please check the TQG copyright policy, which is available on our website www.tasquiltguild.org.au.

PRESENTATION OF QUILTS FOR DISPLAY

- Please sew a label with your name and the title of your quilt onto the back.
 Cover the label with a piece of plain cloth for judging. This should be safety-pinned along the top edge so that the details can be checked but not seen.
- Each quilt must be delivered in its own cloth bag. (A pillow case style bag is suitable - plastic bags will not be accepted.)
- Stitch a cloth label to the bag with the quilt title and your name, contact details and category number (see below). Please print clearly.

CATEGORIES

 Each quilt will be allocated to a category relevant to your age. When you are advised that your item has been accepted you will told the category number.

DELIVERY AND RETURN OF ENTRIES

- Quilts can be delivered to collection depots around the state. These will be listed on the website www.tasquiltguild.org.au approximately two weeks before the exhibition.
- There will be a sign in/sign out form at the collection depot. Please sign this form when you leave your quilt, and again when you collect it.
- Please double-check all details before delivering your entries to the depot. The hostess at the depot may not be able to help with any questions.
- Please deliver your quilt to your nearest depot by Friday 9th September.
- Quilts will be available from the depot (where you delivered your quilt to) on Tuesday 20th September. Please collect your quilt as soon as possible after that date.

REPORTS:

President (Summary) Alison Howlett

Alison offered apologies to anyone inconvenienced by the moving of the date of today's meeting but it was thought that it was better to move the meeting rather than have it on the same day as the Quilters' Easter Showcase. Alison also announced that it had been necessary to move the date of the AGM to 10 September as the original date of 17 September was during the Tasmanian Quilt Expo and it would not have been possible to hold the meeting and the AGM at that time.

Alison reported that ACQ had gone very well and thanked Margaret Treloar for her help in organising the event. She also thanked Chris Coulbeck-McMurray who had been Chairperson for the conference as well as Pam Stewart and Wendy Townsend who had both worked as spotters and general administration assistants.

Winter is coming and members needs to be working on their entries - we need as many quilts as possible to be entered in Island Quilts at the Tasmanian Quilt Expo. Saturday, 19 March, is International Quilting Day and also the date of the Quilters' Easter Showcase to be held in Brighton.

Alison asked members for ideas on what they would like at meetings such as mini classes, talks, etc. We need some fresh ideas. Linda Stillman suggested members be given random numbers at the door and these numbers determined where they sat for the day so that more people would mingle and make new friends. Several ideas were discussed to encourage members to mix more but nothing was decided upon.

Alison advised that she had been contacted by Helen Ducker to ask her to let members know about the screening of "The Tentmakers of Cairo" at the State Theatre on 11 April. This film is a documentary by Kim Beamish about a community of traditional textile artists in Old Cairo who hand stitch elaborate designs on to canvas backings. It is a real coup for Tasmania that the film is to be shown here as it is not to be shown in many places in Australia.

Membership (Wendy Fittler)

As Wendy Fittler was not present there was no report on memberships but it was noted that a couple of new members had joined recently.

Retreats (Zoe Johns)

Zoe advised that there would be two retreats. One with 14 members and the second with only ten members. There will possibly be some late entries and if anyone does want to attend either retreat, please contact Zoe. Zoe also suggested that a decision probably needs to be made as to whether or not one or two retreats are offered. If it is decided that only one retreat is to be offered then attendance will be available on a "first come, first served" basis.

Workshops (Cindy Watkins)

Cindy advised that she had looked at the surveys submitted at the last general meeting but had not had time to follow up on these suggestions as yet. She asked if any members would be interested in attending a seminar/lecture by Ricky Timms as he would possibly come to Tasmania in 2018. He is only available to come to Perth, the NT and Tasmania if we are interested. Cindy said that it would be quite expensive to have him come to Tasmania but we could probably sell quite a few seats to quilters from NSW and Victoria as they would be very keen to attend as well and this could help cover costs.

Newsletter (Wendy Townsend)

Wendy Townsend was not present but had asked that members be advised that the May newsletter will be a week late because she will be attending her son's graduation in early May. Wendy has asked that any contributions for the newsletter be sent to her as early as possible.

Island Quilts (Kate Berry)

Kate advised that the Hobart Showgrounds had been chosen as the venue and said that it was a bit tired but would work well. There will be enough room for 20 traders. A flyer has been produced but the next version will have a map on the back of it giving the location of the exhibition as it is a little difficult to find. There will be signage to help people find their way and there is plenty of parking available.

The judges have been chosen and have accepted and the updated handbook is ready. As last year, entrants will not be asked to select a category for their quilt as these will be allocated by the Categories Subcommittee. Entries will be posted direct to the Treasurer, Susan Holdcroft, at her personal post office box address so that we can have the latest possible entry date.

Kate said that she had been asked if the maximum number of entries could be lifted possibly in response to her encouragement of as many entries as possible. She also said that we need to encourage everyone to show their quilts and that some members are shy about having their quilts judged but they can choose the

option not to have their quilts judged, just exhibited. The public wants to see all kinds of quilts especially some which may encourage them to try quilting and become members.

Success depends on numbers through the door and as there is a giant RV park adjacent to the Showgrounds dates of the exhibition will be advertised in the RV magazines and at ACQ delegates also had some good ideas on how to spread the word

South (Jenny Croxton)

The Quilters' Easter Showcase event is ready to take place next Saturday, 19 March, at the Brighton Civic Centre. All Tasmanian quilters are invited. The committee of QES wish me to thank the committee of TQG for rescheduling today's general meeting to avoid a clash of dates.

Last Saturday the Come Quilting group hosted an informal get-together to enable quilters from several groups in the Hobart area to meet with a group of 20 Canadian quilters from British Columbia who have been visiting Tasmania in the last ten days or so. The visitors were led by Dianne Jansson who is originally from Australia and is the proprietor of Di-Versity, a quilt shop in Pritchard, a little town not far from Kam Loops in British Columbia. We enjoyed a lot of animated conversation, a great afternoon tea and showed off our Tasmanian talent with a very substantial Show and Tell.

North West (Janine Richardson)

The North West and Northern Shop Hop will be continuing through March. There are five shops involved.

The Penguin Village Stitchers will hold a Friendship Day on 11 June and Platypus Patchers will hold a Friendship Day

on 28 May.

North (Karyn Leary)

The Bridport Textile Group and Dorset County Quilters will host a Friendship Day for a Cuppa for Cancer on 30 April from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. The cost is \$10.00 and morning tea and lunch will be provided.

Break O'Day Stitchers will hold their annual Easter exhibition in St Helens on 26 to 29 March.

Also, for those who know Audrey Campbell, she is in hospital and guite unwell. It is her birthday today.

SUB-COMMITTEES

Tasmanian Art Quilt Prize (Barbara Mellor)

There was not really a report for this subcommittee as nothing is happening at the moment but Barbara advised that the travelling exhibition may be reconsidered in future years. The quilts are currently on display in Wynyard and quilts made by Guild members will be displayed at the June meeting.

Valuation Committee (Marlene Boatwright)

Marlene advised that the next Valuation Day will be on 2 April and requests for valuations need to be submitted two weeks before that date so if members want a valuation done, the paperwork will have to be submitted almost immediately. The application form is in the newsletter.

TRADERS:

Sue Domeney, Pam Jarman, Robyn Miller, Cindy Watkins and Lauri Ryan all spoke about the products they had for sale and Robyn Miller demonstrated the new version of the Sweet Sixteen by Handiquilter.

GENERAL BUSINESS:

Kate Berry announced that there would be a meeting of the Island Quilts Committee after the close of this meeting, possibly around 2 p.m. depending on when people were available. She went on to say that she had had a meeting with Cathy from Bernina and that Bernina were very positive about our plans for the Tasmanian Quilt Expo. Bernina have had to change their logo as the cross which is currently being used can only be used when more than 90% of the manufacturing of the item is done in Switzerland and this is not now the case with Bernina products. Any future advertising will have to use the updated logo.

Susan Holdcroft asked the meeting if anyone knew anything about a cash deposit of \$20.00 into the bank account from St Helens as there was no reference on the deposit. Marlene Boatwright thought that this could be payment for the valuation of a guilt and Susan will follow up with her.

Sherrie Jewson spoke about the "Pick a Bag" competition which has been proposed for the Tasmanian Quilt Expo to raise further funds. She explained that each day of the show there would be five bags on display and visitors could purchase a vote for \$1.00 each and that voting slip (which has name and address of the voter written on it) is placed in the bag chosen. At the end of each day one voting slip is drawn from each bag and the bag is won by the person placing that vote. Also, the bag which has the most votes on a day wins a prize. Fifteen bags will be needed for the show and members are asked to make these bags. It is anticipated that there will be more bags than needed so the fifteen bags will be juried into the competition.

Australian Council of Quilters

Alison Howlett and Margaret Treloar gave a summary report on ACQ and noted that a report will be published in the newsletter each quarter giving more details of different aspects of the conference. The conference was a big success and, in particular, the reception at Government House was very well received. The delegates from the mainland states were very impressed and our Governor was very gracious and welcoming. The Hobart Airport Travelodge did a wonderful job and the conference went very smoothly. In particular, the chef went out of his way to provide good meals for those people with food allergies.

Tasmania raised three agenda items – one regarding our problems with Expertise Events, one regarding the future of quilt show generally and one about the proposed commercial memberships. We will let you know more about the discussions on these agenda items in our reports in "Island Threads".

The Australian Council of Quilters has changed its name to QuiltAustralia and will be making an effort to promote quilting in Australia and internationally. A subcommittee has been formed to try to have a booth at Houston next year to promote Australian quilting.

The conference next year will be held in Sydney on 21 and 22 February but from 2018 it is proposed that it will be held in Melbourne straight after AQC as presidents of each Guild generally attend AQC and so have already travelled. Each state would still take turns in hosting the event and organising travel and accommodation as in the past.

The subject of valuations was discussed yet again and we have decided to approach our insurance brokers here and ask them what use they consider the valuations to be. Would loss assessors take them at face value or consider them when assessing a claim? Other topics discussed were teacher accreditation, the National Quilt Register and

Alison advised that any proposal to change or add membership categories would need to be considered at the AGM or at a Special General Meeting. Andrea Kimber spoke about the Quilters' Easter Showcase and gave directions on how to get to the venue. She said that there were to be 17 traders all selling quilt related products and that she hoped that as many people as possible could go along.

The meeting closed at 1.15 p.m. (there was a lunch break of 30 minutes during the meeting)




